

THE BIG BOOK OF MYSTERIES

This bumper book of 95 packed pages explores over 100 real-life mysteries. These include disappearing people, UFOs, natural phenomena, undiscovered creatures, hoaxes, disappearing places, spirits & ghosts, mind over matter, intelligent ancestors and unexplained objects. An engaging book for anyone with a curious mind to browse and dip into. When introducing the book, choose an extract or two to read aloud. The Story of the Mary Celeste on page 16, for example, or The Nazca Lines on page 77.

AUTHORS

Tom Adams is an award-winning television producer and nonfiction author. With a science background, he was inspired to start writing children's books once his eldest son started asking questions about how the world worked. He lives in Kent with his wife and their three teenage sons.

ILLUSTRATOR

Yas Imamura is an Asian American illustrator living in Portland, Oregon. Her preferred materials are gouache and watercolour and often finds herself drawn to projects that are playful, mysterious and a little offbeat.

ACTIVITIES

Fact or fiction? The introduction on page 7 warns the reader to 'beware of false evidence' ...'even though something appears on the internet, or on the television or even in a book, it's important to understand that it doesn't always mean it's true.' Use this as a starting point for a discussion about the importance of using reliable sources and checking information.

Writing inspiration 1. Almost any of the mysteries described could be used to inspire a piece of imaginative writing.

Writing inspiration 2. Choose a favourite mystery and do some more research about it, using other books, websites and articles. Use your research to create a new piece of non-fiction writing about the mystery, combining information from your different sources. Don't forget to list the sources at the end.

A WORLD FULL OF JOURNEYS AND MIGRATIONS

A World Full of Journeys & Migrations is about the movement of people AND ideas! The stories are organised according to the five continents, with additional sections about the spread of storytelling, music and food, for example, as well as the journeys made by animals, plants and even diseases.

When introducing the book, choose an extract to read aloud. The Story of Brick Lane on pages 68-69, for example, describes what each wave of new arrivals brought with them to London over time.

AUTHOR



ACTIVITIES

Why we move Discuss the main reasons for people moving. Use the image on pages 6-7 as a point of reference. Can your class or group think of different examples from history or the present day?

Mapping the world Look at the map on pages 10-11. How does this look different from the view of the world we are more used to. Ask your pupils to find some of the different 'projections' of the world – the Mercator, the Peters and the Pacific-centred, for example. Discuss how they make us look at the world differently and ask which one they think is the most accurate. You might also want to watch 'Why All Maps Are Wrong' (in Links),.


Footprint art Create a border for a display to represent 'journeys' or 'migrations' using the footprint template (in Links). Decorate with maps, landscapes, transport, people, animals, plants, flags, etc..

LANDS OF BELONGING

Published for the 75th anniversary of the partition of India in August 2022, this book is a unique exploration of the rich and complicated history of India, Pakistan, Bangladesh, and Britain. Lands of Belonging is both a historical deep dive and a modern celebration of South Asian influence. Choose an extract to read aloud as part of your introduction to the book. For example, try Inventive Ancient India (pages 10-11) or A Day in Your Life (pages 42-43).

ACTIVITIES

Chronological order. The information in this book is written in chronological order, with a timeline on pages 58–62 which summarises the key events. Practice using this useful approach to historical information by creating a timeline of some of the main world events from the last forty years. Alternatively, pupils could be invited to create timelines for their own lives, perhaps with the help of their family members.

Sports and games. Using the book, make a list of games and sports mentioned that have South Asian connections. Compare the merits of the different methods you use to find this information such as skim reading the book, or using the contents and index.


Kabaddi, one of the team games mentioned, which is extremely popular in South Asia. Have a go at playing it, following the instructions on page 49.

TALKING HISTORY

Talking History: 150 Years of Speakers and Speeches contains the stories of 16 fascinating people, from different parts of the world, living in momentous times. Presented in contemporary graphic novel style, covering a wide range of important issues, this book will inspire a new generation of thinkers and talkers. Each of the speeches is allocated two double-page spreads which explore the events leading up to the speech, include quotes from the speech and reveal the impact of the speech on the world. When introducing the book select one of the speeches. Give a guided tour of the pages, reading some extracts aloud and point out the signposts to more information at the end of each section.

AUTHORS



ACTIVITIES

Downloadable activities. Look at the classroom notes provided by the publisher (see Links) and choose from the following activities: Speeches – How They're Made and How to Make Them; Geography – Around the World; History – Words Through Time; Technology; or Evaluating Information – Believe It or Not?

Watch and listen The book quotes from Greta Thunberg's 'Our House is on Fire' speech made in January 2019 (link in notes). Eight months later she made the 'How Dare You' speech at the UN Climate Action Summit in New York (see Links). Described as a 'blistering criticism of the world leaders' inaction on climate change.' Discuss how you think Greta has made a difference?

Design a banner based on one of your favourite quotes from the book.
